USE THE CAMP SAVINGS PLAN

POLICY FOR SHORT-TERM USE OF CAMPING PROPERTY

Nassau County Council

Boy Scouts of America

I. DEFINITION

Any use of Council Camp property exclusive of the programmed summer operation by the Council at Wauwepex will be classified a "short-term."

II. PURPOSE

For directing the use and administration of Council Camp properties, it is felt that some well-defined understanding should be reached with each Unit that will:

1. Encourage a maximum of outdoor experience for the individual boy, at the same time providing adequate advancement opportunity.
2. Conserve and develop the facilities on Council Reservations that we may best serve each Unit.

In accomplishing this, it is deemed advisable to open the Reservations primarily for those activities which provide the opportunity for fulfilling our objectives, and rejecting the use of the Reservations for other purposes. We must, therefore, define as "priority use" essentially the following activities:

1. Day (only) activities of Packs participated in by Fathers and Cubs concurrently.
2. Day and overnight activities of Troops under the leadership of adults.
3. Day and overnight activities of individual Patrols under their own leadership, for the purpose of fulfilling Second Class Requirement 5 ("Take a Hike"), or First Class Requirement 7 ("Go Camping").
4. Day and overnight activities of individual Crews under their own leadership, for the purpose of achieving Merit Badge requirements or ratings.

Finally, it should be the continuous objective of the Council Camping Committee to check on the use of Reservations by every Unit, and to counsel with them on any particulars of their short-term program.

III. LEADERSHIP

Recognizing that efficient program and boy enjoyment depend largely upon the quality and responsibilities of leadership in camping activities, there must be strict understanding of the necessity for leaders from the Unit itself, in full charge at all times and accountable for a healthy Scouting Program. There can be no deviation from the leadership requirements imposed (reverse side) on short-term groups using the Reservations.

Likewise, it is to be pointed out that the leadership requirements set forth here are minimums. The minimum acceptable leadership for short-term camping groups is as follows:

- A. CUBS - In active charge at all times there must be (1) a Cubmaster or Assistant Cubmaster, and one or more adults (male or female) for each Den in attendance.
- B. TROOPS - In active charge at all times, there must be (1) the Unit's Scoutmaster, or (2) a member of the Unit's Troop Committee.
- C. PATROLS - In active charge at all times, there must be (1) the Patrol's Patrol Leader and Assistant Patrol Leader, or (2) any adult registered with the Unit.

WHEN MORE THAN ONE PATROL from the same Unit camps as a group, the requirements under "B" above shall apply.

D. POSTS, SHIPS OR SQUADRONS - In active charge at all times, there must be (1) the Unit's Advisor, or (2) a member of the Unit Committee.

E. CREWS - In active charge at all times, there must be (1) the Crew's Crew Leader and Assistant Crew Leader, or (2) any adult registered with the Unit.

IV. PERMITS AND RULES

No use will be permitted of Council Camp property by representatives of any Unit or District without a properly executed "Short Term Camping Permit" together with the compliance of such representatives with the "Rules and Conditions Governing Short Term Camping".

The Council Executive Board designates the Rangers on the Reservations as authority for dealing forthwith with any rules infractions. If immediate safety or comfort of others is in jeopardy, the Unit may be expelled at once. Serious or repeated infractions will be reviewed by the Council Camping Committee, and appropriate action taken where necessary.

DEPOSITS

A deposit of \$5.00 shall accompany the application for the use of CABINS; said deposit to be returned upon satisfactory completion of the camping period or if the permit is cancelled at the request of the Unit seven days in advance of its use, or by the Council on twenty-four (24) hours notice to the Unit.

HOLIDAY CAMPING SCHEDULE

All Council owned Camps and Reservations will be closed on the days listed:

New Years Eve and New Years Day
December 31 and January 1

Easter Sunday

Christmas Eve and Christmas Day
December 24 and 25

Cabin Reservation:

A Unit shall be allowed to reserve 2 cabins during any twelve months period. It is the Unit's choice whether they wish one cabin at two different times or two cabins at one time. Cabins are not available during July and August (Summer Camping Season)

Use of Harkness by "Out of Council Units":

That because of the demands from Units of our own Council, the camping facilities at Harkness are restricted for use by Units of Nassau County Council.

Use of Council Facilities by Guests of Units:

Registered Scout and Explorer Units are permitted to invite out-of-Council Units to be their guests on Council Facilities. In so doing, they will make necessary application to use the facility.

Mixed Groups:

Council Explorer Units may be permitted to invite Girl Scouts or similar recognized Organization (both under adequate leadership) to be their guests on Council facilities during the day and evenings. In so doing they will make necessary application to use the facility.

Tents:

A limited number of pup tents and Jamboree tents are available for Units to use. No Wall tents are available to Units.

When program and menu are received in the Scout Office, permit will be made in duplicate, one copy to be mailed to Unit Leader and presented by him to Ranger upon arrival at camp. This copy will be signed by Ranger and returned to Unit after completion of Camping experience. Second copy will be mailed to Ranger. After completion by Ranger, this will be returned to Council Office for record.

RULES AND CONDITIONS GOVERNING SHORT-TERM CAMPING

1. PERMITS — Permits for the use of Council camp properties are to be issued on the form on the reverse side, only, at the Council Office. Unit cannot secure Permit on less than one (1) week notice, and the Council reserves the right to cancel Permit on twenty-four (24) hours notice to the Unit. It is understood that the acceptance of this Permit by signature of Unit Leader, absolves the Council of responsibility for personal accident or property damage suffered by Unit Members on Council property. A returnable deposit of five dollars (\$5.00) will be required in each reservation for a cabin. Cancellation of reservation by unit must be made at least 1 week before date of arrival.
2. ENTERING AND LEAVING — Observe the arrival time and leaving time, as stated in the Permit, as closely as possible. *No one is to enter before consulting the Ranger in any case. Only registered Scouts are admitted, and registration cards should be available for the Ranger's inspection.*

It will be assumed that all of your group will remain on the Reservation *until properly checked out*. You must possess a completed copy of Permit before use of the Reservation is terminated. Automotive vehicles are to be parked in assigned areas, *only*. Roads must be maintained open for travel at all times. At Harkness, bicycles may be taken to sites, but no bicycle riding is permitted at this reservation.
3. ACTIVITY HOURS — Hours for activity on Reservations are between 7:00 A.M. and 10:30 P.M. At all other times, you will *confine your group to the limits of your site and will restrict noise, lights and movement* in consideration for others. Do not enter other occupied campsites without the permission of the Unit thereon.
4. OFF LIMITS —

Training Building & Grounds	Ranger's home and grounds
All buildings except those approved on the reverse side	
5. FIRES — Request the Ranger's Instructions on the number and location of fires. You will be expected to use caution in laying fires, and to *keep fires and open lights away from buildings* and constructions, poles and wiring, and live trees or shrubs.

Fires are to be used for cooking and waste disposal only, except in cool weather, and should not be "built up" to dangerous or nuisance proportions. Guard your fire at all times. The use of underwriters approved gasoline, propane or kerosene lamps or stoves will be permitted by adults only, fuel must be stored in underwriters approved containers.
6. CONSERVATION — Do not bark, cut or fell live trees or parts thereof, or unnecessarily destroy shrubs, flowers, or wildlife. The use of edged tools must be supervised by the Unit Leader and the Ranger will insist on their safe and proper use at all times. The Council reserves the right to deny the use on the Reservation of long knives, long-handled axes, or machetes, whenever their use is deemed unsafe, and to restrict the number of tools used by any single Unit. The Council will welcome your Unit's participation in conservation projects at the Reservation.
7. DISPOSAL — All solid garbage, except cans and bottles, is to be burned in prescribed manner. Liquid wastes may be poured into deep holes of small diameter, but no solid matter is to be buried at any time. (see Scoutmaster Handbook pg. 245) Burn out food cans, and place with bottles in burlap sack provided you. Carry sack to gate when checking out.
8. SANITATION — Your Unit, possibly along with others, will be assigned a specific Sanitary Building (latrine, with or without washing facilities). It will be your responsibility to cooperate in using it properly. No other method of human disposal is permitted. Dishwashing and personal toilet is not permitted at water taps, drinking fountains, springs and streams. These activities are to be performed on your site.
9. ACCIDENTS — Report all accidents, forest fires, or property damage to the Ranger at once. Observe the location of First Aid equipment in the Ranger's Office, and be prepared to cooperate with him in its use.

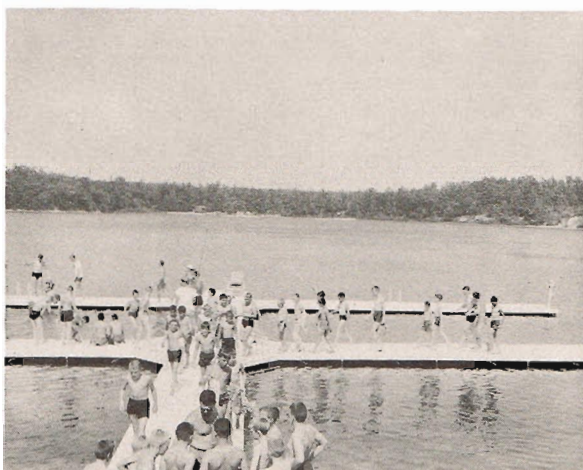
Use of physician, hospital or Council first-aid equipment is at the risk and to the account of the Unit requesting such treatment. Transportation of injured must be arranged by unit.

Reservation telephone is available for emergency use only, at user's expense.
10. INFRACTIONS — The Council Executive Board designates the Rangers on the Reservations as authority for dealing forthwith with any rules infractions. If immediate safety or comfort of others is in jeopardy, the Unit may be expelled at once.

For serious or repeated infractions, the Council may deny the use of the Reservations to a Unit.
11. HUNTING & FIREARMS — No hunting on Council property at any time. The use of firearms, archery equipment, gas guns, and air guns are not permitted except with the approval of the Council Camping and Activities Committee.
12. SWIMMING — Is permitted only under "Council employed leadership." Such Leadership will be provided during warm weather of the Short-Term Camping Season.
13. FISHING — Permitted only as a part of an organized camp activity.
14. PETS — Dogs, cats or other pets are not permitted in any of the camping properties.

Failure to submit individual application by April 15, 1958, will cause cancellation of Campsite reservation.

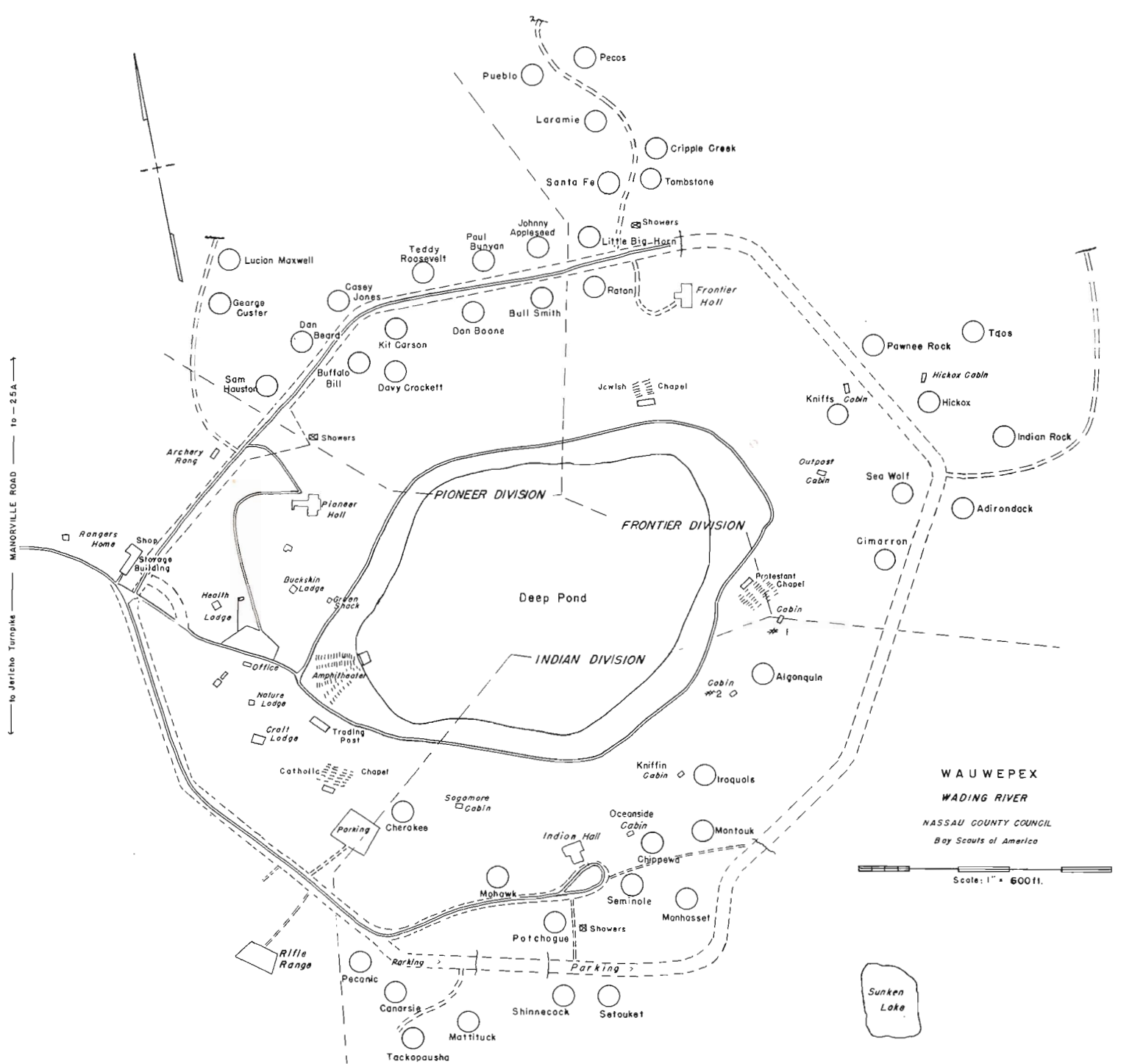

TROOP CAMPING

1. Troops making reservation for the regular (13 days) or half (6 days) period are required to deposit a \$10.00 reservation fee together with the Troop Application. Applications will be accepted in the order received. The \$10.00 reservation fee will apply toward the regular camping fees of the Troop. Reservation fee will be forfeited in the event cancellation of Troop Camping Reservation. This reservation and fee is accepted with the understanding that the Troop will attend camp under its own leadership. Troops cannot combine under one leader to secure Troop camping rate.
2. Troop Leader attends camp as the guest of the Council. Leaders must be registered adult (at least 21 years of age) Scouters. In order that the Troop receive maximum benefit of the camping program, it is imperative that Troop Leadership serve for at least one week. It is highly desirable that the leadership serve for the two week period, if possible.
3. Each Troop is required to submit an individual Scout Application for each Scout, together with \$5.00 reservation fee prior to April 15, 1958. Registration fee is not refundable. The balance of the Troop Camping fees must be paid at the Council Office not later than June 1, 1958. All payment of fees must be made by the Troop. Total Fee -- \$35.00 per Scout for 2 week period.
