Steve Shull Wanders Down Memory Lane: Changeover Saturday

First in a Series

One of the unique aspects of Onteora Scout Reservation was that each two-week period began and ended on a Saturday. While most camps would have check-out on Saturday and welcome incoming Scouts on Sunday, the program at OSR called for all this to take place in one day. This gave the Scouts an extra day in camp and optimized the use of buses and vans to haul Scouts and their gear 150 miles in each direction. It was also the time when Onteora's staff pushed themselves to the limit. In peak years, there were an average of about 1,200 Scouts and their gear moving in opposite directions.

Changeover Saturdays began at the crack of dawn in three or four Long Island locations - Valley Stream, Garden City, Hicksville and Massapequa. Scouts and their gear would descend on a shopping mall parking lot, where an 18-wheeler was waiting to transport their gear. Buses were lined up for the trip to Livingston Manor. Ken Heim cut a great deal with Schenk Bus Lines. My recollection is that in 1963, it cost \$4.00 per person round-trip, including the gear. For many years, the trip up to camp would include a stop at the Red Apple Rest in Harriman, at the foot of Bear Mountain. In the early years, the route ran up old Route 17 (before it was improved and christened the

"Quickway"), and the Grooville Road was paved only up to the Welles House, so the last 1.5 miles to the Ranger's house was dirt road. It was a four-plus hour ride; plenty of time for a couple choruses of "100 Bottles of Beer on the Wall".

Meanwhile at OSR, outbound Scouts were cleaning their sites and packing their gear. Each troop would pile their gear by the roadside at the entrance to the site. All gear bore a colored tag, indicating the L.I. shopping mall destination for the returning gear. Program Staff would inspect the site and clear the troop to leave. The Scouts would then head to the water tank, where they'd receive a couple hot dogs and drink for lunch, and wait there till the buses were ready to receive them for the ride back to Long Island.

The parking lot was already teeming with activity. By this time, the vans had arrived and were being offloaded. Waterfront staff got the assignment of unloading and loading all the gear from the vans. Most staff members joked about how the guys at the waterfront didn't have to work very hard, but they sure made up for it on changeover Saturday. Through all the grunting and sweating in those vans, the staff developed a tradition of shredding one another's tee shirts. As the day progressed, the tees gradually disintegrated until they were tattered rags and there was

barely enough material left to make a headband.

Paper plates nailed to the fence on the west (lake) side of the parking lot served as markers for each troop/site, and incoming gear would be piled in the appropriate location. Once the vans were unloaded, they were ready to receive the gear of the outbound campers.

There were typically four or five crews of three to five staffers who were responsible for getting the all the gear moved from the sites to the parking lot. Each crew was assigned to a truck which was driven by a staff member of the maintenance crew. In my era, a typical Saturday would see Mike Brenner driving the Blue Rack, Phill Clark in the Yellow Dump, Gary Cryan in the Grey Dump and Leland Tuttle driving Leland's Ford. On very heavy Saturdays, Ranger Bill would have a crew on the Green Rack, a vehicle that was normally reserved only for out-of-camp destinations. I worked on these crews for two summers, and was most fortunate to often find myself on Leland Tuttle's crew. Not only was Leland great to be around, but because his truck was the smallest, his crew got assigned most of the smaller sites. Leland must've been over 70 in those years, but he

In memoriam, Steve Miller (Feb. 4, 2007)

Some months after Steve Miller died, the letters went out to OAA members reminding one and all that it was time to renew their memberships. Not knowing Steve had died, a note went to his Kirkwood, NY home as well.

His widow, Dorinne, sent a note to Rick Balla, explaining how Steve, who was 54, had suffered a fatal heart attack.

"I cannot begin to express how much Steve valued and loved being a part of the OAA," she wrote. "He often shared stories of his time at Boy Scout Camp when he was a child. Every fall, he so looked forward to the annual camping trip."

Mrs. Miller said she was sure Steve was with us in spirit on the last fall fellowship weekend and went on to wish the members of the OAA the best of luck. "Thank you," she wrote, "for playing such a positive role in Steve's all too short life."

Steve grew up on Long Island and remained active with the Boy Scouts for more than 40 years. After graduating from Hofstra University, he went on to work at several TV stations, including WICZ-TV40, where he worked for over 21 years as the chief broadcasting engineer.

In memoriam, Thomas Antos (Feb. 3, 2005)...

Sad news does not always travel quickly so in this issue, we also share the news of the passing of Tom Antos, formerly of Carle Place and an Onteora staff member.

Tom was 57 when he succumbed to cancer. He served for 23 years in the US Navy Submarine Corp before retiring to Summerville, South Carolina.

In memoriam, Sturges Shields Jr. (Jan.15, 2008)

Sturges Shields was a legend in Stewart Manor, where the community honored him some years back for his decades of selfless service to the Boy Scouts of America and especially Troop 134.

Sturges, a resident of Stewart Manor, was 91. He was active with the Boy Scouts for more than 50 years, starting in 1953 as treasurer for Pack 134. He volunteered in numerous positions with Nassau County Council (as Teddy Roosevelt Council was known for much of its existence) and served on the executive board four terms. He also served as Onteora's Reservation Director in 1978.

He was awarded the Silver Beaver Award in 1969 and the Chairman's Award from the Shelter Rock District in 2002. In 2001, the Village of Stewart Manor bestowed the community service award for his years of service to Boy Scout Troop 134. The OAA named him a Legend of Onteora in 2004.

In his professional life, he served for 30 years with the United Nations, his postings including Jamaica, Jerusalem, the Congo, Mexico City and Geneva.

Sturges was predeceased by his wife, Joan, who died in 1999. He is survived by his sons, Lawrence and Bradford.

Indian Lore and the horses.

Ralph had a passion for teaching and an amazing ability to develop the staff. He gave his staff responsibility, sometimes beyond what they felt capable of achieving. But Ralph was always there to coach, encourage and challenge. Everyone who worked for Ralph will be forever indebted to him for helping them to develop leadership skills and a positive, can-do outlook on life.

Jim Shields, Sr. was the primary driver behind the Indian Lore Program which to this day remains a vital and unique part of Onteora's program. Jim was never on staff although his sons Jim and Tom both worked at OSR in the late 60's and early 70's. Jim was a founder and adviser to Post 1876 which was dedicated to Indian Lore and contributed so many of its members to our staff. One of the highlights of the Visitor Saturday campfires was the Indian dances, performed by various staff and/or members of 1876 and directed by Jim. Jim also saw to it that the OA used more authentic costumes in

its ceremonies. Jim is now deceased but the mark that he left on Onteora's program and many staff members is a great legacy.

Ken South was on Onteora's staff from 1962 until 1970. Ken is also best remembered for his contribution to the Visitor's Saturday campfire, leading the entire staff in the songs that we sang at the end of the campfire. This was a most moving experience for the many thousands who attended those campfires, not least of all for the staff. We rehearsed the songs each night of staff week

until Ken was satisfied that the staff would perform as close to a trained choir as was humanly possible. Those of us who were on staff in those years will undoubtedly recall rehearsing "On My Honor", and enunciating the "d" at the end of the line "...do my duty to God". Ken worked in several program areas, including JLTC, and was Program Director in 1969 and Director of Special Programs in 1970. Ken left his imprint on many a Scout and staffer and will always be remembered for infectious enthusiasm and high level of energy. In February, 2008, Marc Ryan, who served as OSR camp director for two summers, '03 and '04, was recognized for his contributions to summer camp, but all of his support over the years to Onteora.

Marc was inducted at his going away dinner, marking his move from the TR Council staff to a Philadelphia area council.

At the Winter Gathering in March, 2008, Chris Wieczkowski, an OSR staffer from '99 to '06, was recognized as someone who truly lived the spirit and traditions of Onteora.

Opened up the Long House dining room and kitchen for the 2007 season *

Thoroughly cleaned the Long House Kitchen reach-in and walk in units (racks, walls, floors) and rolling salad bar * Trimmed trees back from the road from the water tank to Dan Beard Shelter (and removed the dying tree hanging over Forry Cabin) * Removed and replaced front steps to A-4; removed and began replacement of rear deck to A-4 * Installed drop in ceiling (including light fixture) in

Health Lodge ward bathroom * Installed surface mounted light fixture in Health Lodge aide's room * Installed base molding in Long House cook's quarters * Removed old reach-ins and refrigerator from the Staff Alumni Center for future disposal * Floated and connected 2 dock sections in the lake to facilitate initial bathing water sampling * Constructed 10 complete platform deck halves * Installed 95% of the ceiling insulation in the Staff Alumni Center * Straightened up/cleaned out Staff Alumni Center to facilitate upcoming interior work *

Thoroughly cleaned out A-1 * Completed electrical service upgrade at Maintenance Shop (including main panel and 2 auxiliary panels * Replaced ballasts in Maintenance Shop and Long House light fixtures * Painted Staff Alumni Center porch doors and applied polyurethane to wood door in Long House cook's quarters * Repaired damaged A-4 roof shingle * Repaired Trading Post "in" door and Long House dining room door (fireplace end, porch side) * Unboxed 10 new camper tents, rolled 5 with ridge and uprights * Installed ceramic tile around shower house utility sink * Re-secured Council House door

Loaded and unloaded as many footlockers as anyone on his crew.

As the footlockers were finding their way down to the parking lot and onto the vans, buses would finally be pulling into the parking lot and unloading hundreds of Scouts, all eager to be at OSR and wearing their nice clean uniforms with a bathing suit underneath. The Scouts would line up and march down to the nurse's office. In the early years, Nurse Anderson's office was on the upper level of the Manor House, which sat near the top of the parade ground just below the parking lot.

Once they were checked out, it was on to the waterfront to take their swim test. A few of the waterfront crew would leave the van loading assignment to man the docks and facilitate the swim tests.

At about mid-day, the outbound Scouts were released to the parking lot where they would board the buses and head for home. Meanwhile, the truck crews were finally finished getting all the outbound gear down to the parking lot and onto the vans and would now begin the reverse process of bringing gear up to each of the sites. Scouts leaving the

waterfront wearing wet swimwear and with their uniforms in a ball would climb the hill to their site, where with a little luck their footlockers and gear would be waiting by the side of road.

By about 5:00 p.m., all the gear was hauled up to the sites. Staff would return to their normal duties, bearing a few bumps and bruises but proud to have worked together as a team to accomplish such a monumental task.
